a letter from Our House's executive director

Dear Friends,

We want to start by thanking you for all you have done to make life a little easier for Our House clients and residents. Your generous dollars truly alleviate many of the burdens they face in their daily lives.

Did you know 1 in 6 persons living with HIV in Oregon are food insecure and struggling to meet their basic needs? Even though healthy food is essential to optimal health, under-resourced Oregonians living with HIV face many barriers to food access including transportation, depression, and fatigue (Oregon Health Authority, 2015). Most food pantry options create further barriers including stigma, long waits, and concerns about types of food offered. While we are shedding layers and enjoying warmer weather, our neighbors in the HIV community living with limited or no income, are already thinking towards winter when food, as well as dry, clean, warm clothes, will be essential to their survival.

Our Community Services staff and volunteers work hard to provide for our client's basic needs year-round in a respectful, welcoming, loving, and compassionate environment. We are proud that Esther's Pantry has been designated **Oregon's first LGBTQ+ Affirming Food Pantry by the Oregon Food Bank.** Also, thanks to a generous grant from the Elizabeth Taylor AIDS Foundation and matching funds from our donors, **we have launched a new transportation initiative that will increase access to Community Services by providing public transit and Lyft vouchers to clients.** This will help us increase our reach across the city and serve more women, families, and children impacted by HIV. **Our Community Services Manager Brent Blackwell's work to eradicate hunger is boundless: he recently participated in the Oregon Hunger Response Day in Salem and met with legislators to lobby for increased funds to end hunger.**

Thank you for your ongoing dedication to our neighbors and friends living with HIV. We appreciate your support along Our House's ever-evolving journey to provide compassionate care and to end suffering for individuals with HIV in Portland.



about Our House

With the help of amazing staff, dedicated volunteers, and exceptional supporters, Our House of Portland provides healthcare, housing, and other vital services to people in need in our community living with HIV.

Our House has been part of the Portland community since 1988. Our services have expanded but our commitment to people living with HIV has remained the same. HIV is a complex and challenging disease that can often be overwhelming.

Our House of Portland is comprised of four fantastic programs:

Our House Residential Care is a team of expert clinicians who work with people with HIV who are having difficulty managing independent living. By tailoring nursing, social work and Occupational Therapy our clients and residents are able to define what 'living well' means to them.

Our **Neighborhood Housing and Care Program** provides social work services, nursing, and Occupational Therapy for people *in their own homes*, providing support so that our clients can live independently as long as possible.

Tod's Corner provides free clothing and household goods for clients living with HIV.

Esther's Pantry, a shopping style food pantry, provides food and personal care items for individuals and families impacted by HIV.

Through these four programs, as the health of our residents and clients improves or declines, we are able to provide personalized services within our continuum of care.
